(1) Importance of SAIs

- Supreme Audit Institutions (SAIs) provide external oversight of the use of public funds.
- They constitute a key component of accountability and the separation of powers between the executive, legislative and judiciary.

Effective public sector auditing matters because it:

- Promotes transparency and accountability
- Strengthens state-society relations
- Contributes to managing donor's fiduciary and development effectiveness risk

(1) Past and Continuing Challenges for SAIs

Unclear Global Picture

- How much support do SAIs need, how much is provided, and what is the resource gap?
- Has support provided been effective?
- Have SAIs become more independent?
- Have SAIs improved the quality and coverage of their audit work?
- Have SAIs contributed to improved accountability, transparency, governance and sound utilization of public funds?

Weak Resource Allocation

- Some SAIs & regions with major needs received little support
- Other SAIs had overlapping support projects
- Support sometimes driven by donor priorities, not SAI priorities
- Many SAIs had not developed strategic or development action plans


Poor Coordination at Country Level

- INTOSAl and Donor communities operated in isolation
- Uncoordinated projects working on the same tasks
- Different projects proposing different solutions to same challenge
- Different SAIs and consultancy firms competing to deliver support
- Piecemeal support rather than long term partnerships

(1) The INTOSAI-Donor Cooperation

Objectives of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU)

- Strategic cooperation between donors and the SAI community to strengthen SAI capacity in developing countries
- Donors to mobilize additional funding for SAI capacity development, through a variety of funding mechanisms
- Consistent with aid effectiveness principles agreed in the Paris
 Declaration and Accra Agenda for Action
- A Global Peer Partnership approach to development, consistent with the Busan Global Partnership for Effective Development Cooperation

(1) The INTOSAI-Donor Cooperation Governance Structure

Steering Committee

Decision making body. Comprises all donor signatories and nine SAIs appointed to represent the INTOSAI Committees and Regions. Meets at least annually, open to observers.

Steering Committee Leadership Provides continuous oversight and direction.

Co-Chairs: Osama Faqueeh, General Auditing Bureau, Saudi Arabia, and Jennifer Thomson, World Bank.

Vice Chairs: Gene Dodaro, US Government Accountability Office, and Stephen Sharples, UK Department for International Development.

INTOSAI-Donor Secretariat Supports the Steering Committee in implementing the MoU. Hosted by the INTOSAI Development Initiative (IDI) in Oslo, Norway.

Funded by: Irish Aid, The Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation, and The Austrian Development Agency.

(2) 2010 Stocktaking Effort

What?

- First global mapping of SAI capacity development initiatives and needs
- Carried out by the INTOSAI-Donor Secretariat through the INTOSAI (sub)regions
- Response rate was above 90%, covering 183 SAIs and 8 INTOSAI (sub)regions

Key Findings

- Estimated funding gap of 269 million US\$ for capacity development initiatives; 85% in LI & LMI countries
- SAIs see an added value in receiving peer support
- 59 % of SAIs from LI & LMI countries report a financial audit coverage above 50%, but one in six audit less than 10%.
- Many SAIs report they do not meet their own expectations in performance auditing
- Marginal improvement in SAI performance over time (PEFA data)

Conclusion

 A clear need to scale up the levels of support to SAIs in developing countries and to improve the coordination of the support provided

- ✓ Program document for phase 2 of the Cooperation was approved at the 5th Steering Committee Meeting in London, October 2012
- ✓ Entails a moderate scaling up of activities compared to first phase






(4.2) Funding Mechanisms and Project Identification Global Call for Proposals

- What: Coordinated effort allowing SAIs globally to identify and articulate capacity development initiatives in need of additional financing
- Why: Identify needs of the global SAI community and mobilize support from development partners;
 - Better coordination of support
 - Well-informed funding decisions
 - Better programs based on SAIs' identification of needs
- How: INTOSAI-Donor Secretariat facilitates the process:
 - Invitation to submit proposals September 2011 and October 2013
 - Secretariat provides guidance in writing proposals/concept notes
 - Summary of proposals shared with Steering Committee
 - Donors make individual funding decisions
 - Secretariat coordinates matching process


Proposals Received


- ✓ Aggregate financial support sought is 90 million US\$
- ✓ Africa represents the bulk; 50,5 million US\$
- ✓ 75 % of proposals request INTOSAI peer as implementing partner
- ✓ 15 proposals are aimed at ISSAI implementation

Proposals Matched per January 2013

- ✓ 12 of 55 proposals (22 %) have materialized (projects in progress)
- ✓ 3 proposals (6 %) have had financing approved
- ✓ dialogue with potential providers ongoing for 14 proposals (26 %)

(4.2) Funding Mechanisms and Project Identification SAI Capacity Development Fund

Rationale for Pooled Funding

- Scale up support to SAIs in developing countries
- Enhance effectiveness of support:
 - Allocative efficiency global flow of funds reflects need and agreed priorities, not individual donor preferences
 - Support aligned and harmonized with SAI-led plans
 - Reduced transaction costs for SAIs and donors
- Enable donors with a presence in a small number of countries to have a wider global impact

The pooled fund will:

- be complementary to, not replace, bilateral support
- be hosted by the World Bank
- have a Funding Board which will make the funding decisions
- not allow for direct earmarking

Mandate: Johannesburg Accords (INCOSAI XX, 2010)


What is a Performance Measurement Framework (PMF)?

Tool for measuring performance

- ...of an individual, system or organization
- ...against an agreed performance scale
- ...accommodating local circumstances

<u>To enable</u>


- Better management of performance
- Monitoring over time
- Evaluation and lesson learning
- Contributing to
 - Understanding performance
 - Improving performance



What is a SAI Performance Measurement Framework?

- A Performance Measurement Framework tailored to SAIs
- Intended to give a holistic, high level assessment of SAI performance against established INTOSAI good practice:
 - The International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI) framework
 - The Framework on the Value and Benefits of SAIs
 - Other INTOSAI guidance material
- Combination of objective measurement and qualitative assessment – aims to follow the 12 criteria for an effective SAI PMF
- Covers the SAI's internal capabilities, as well as its external performance
- Assesses SAI performance in the country context and aims at identifying the value and benefits of the SAI to society (impact)

Evidence Based Assessment of Performance



(4.3) SAI Performance Measurement Framework SAI PMF – How will it be done in Practice?

- 1. Using the SAI PMF will be **voluntary** for the SAIs the tool will be a public good which SAIs can make use of if it helps them achieve their objectives
- 2. The SAIs themselves will make the key decisions regarding the assessment
- 3. The SAI will also decide whether or not to publish results
- 4. Because it is voluntary, the SAI PMF is **not intended to replace any internal** performance measurement or reporting procedures

Who decides to <u>initiate</u> a SAI PMF? Head of SAI

Who decides when to do a SAI PMF? Head of SAI

- Consulting with INTOSAI regions & donors as appropriate
- Every 3-5 years recommended

Who decides <u>how</u> to do a SAI PMF? Head of SAI

- Approach selected to meet the SAI's objectives
- 3 broad approaches
- Quality assurance to promote objectivity and credibility

Who decides if, when and how to publish a SAI PMF?


3 Approaches to Conducting an SAI PMF Assessment


There are three main approaches to conducting an assessment using the SAI PMF. The PMF will be equally well suited for all three:

1. SAI Self 2. INTOSAI Peer 3. External Assessment Review Assessment Trained Team Professional Peer SAL from within PFM Body INTOSAL the SAL Regional Body Donor Agency Consultant External auditor SAI Involvement

- The approach will not necessarily affect how the assessment is carried out...
- ... but the SAI may use the results for different purposes depending on the approach

Rationale for Developing a SAI PMF





(4.4) Knowledge Center on Support to SAIs SAI Capacity Development Database

- Launched at <u>www.SAldevelopment.org</u> in January 2012
- Administered by the IDI
- Builds on the CBC Directory of the INTOSAI Capacity Building Committee

Contains information on:

- All projects/programs targeting SAIs globally, regardless of size
- Ongoing, planned and proposed initiatives
- Donors and SAI providers asked to enter and update projects
- 275 projects registered to date 2,750 visits from 149 countries since January 2012

Purpose:

- Better coordination of support to SAIs
- Making better decisions on support to SAIs
- Gives opportunity to analyze the support provided to SAIs

(4.4) Knowledge Center on Support to SAIs

- ✓ Repository of knowledge about SAI capacity development based on experience, network, the 2010 Stocktaking, the database and the Global Call for Proposals
- ✓ Dissemination of global public goods
- ✓ Provide information to and connecting donors and SAIs

Training for donors on working with SAIs:

 Develop and deliver first specific, detailed course for donors on SAIs – in response to interest from several donor agencies

Training for SAIs on engagement with donors and writing funding applications:

- Need identified through 2011 Global Call for Proposals
- Training and workshops, including to help SAIs better articulate and communicate their capacity building needs to donors
- First course held for French speaking SAIs in Congo Brazzaville in July 2012

(4.5) Strengthening the Supply Side of Support to SAIs

- Establishing a community of practice: knowledge sharing seminars and networking opportunities for current and potential SAI providers
- More evidence-based knowledge about success factors of support to SAIs – using and improving project evaluations

Why?

- Need for increased volume of peer to peer support
- Better allocation of peer-peer support to match demand
- Improved quality and impact of the support provided

(4.6) Research and Evidence on SAIs

- Research and generation of evidence relevant to SAIs in developing countries
- Agenda to evolve during 2013-2015
- Possibly establish a mechanism for identifying and funding research: Issuing calls for research proposals, managing research grants and arranging events for dissemination of results

Focus areas 2013:

- ➤ Mapping of SAI involvement in the audit of extractive industries (oil & gas, mining etc.)
- Explore levels and adequacy of funding for SAIs

(4.7) Monitoring, Evaluation and Lesson Learning

Update of 2010 Stocktaking Report

- Update of selected topics not entire report
- To allow comparison to baselines from 2010

Synthesis of SAI project evaluations

- To facilitate learning in support to SAIs
- Identify common lessons and good practices

Impact assessment of INTOSAI-Donor Cooperation

- To be carried out in 2014
- Inform decisions on way forward

Program monitoring

- Updates on activities at SC meetings
- Annual written progress report
